To follow Jesus, the Word, we need to be welcoming and to love, that is, "to be concerned about another, to be attentive to another's needs, to help another find his or her place in the community." (Jean Vanier).

Together, we can continue to endeavor to live community life in all its forms: family life, friendship, church community, welcoming the stranger, reaching out to alleviate other's pain, being welcoming in all circumstances and by seeing others as equal...not less than or more than us.

Jesus says, "I am meek and humble of heart." If we are to more closely follow Jesus we need to reflect on His quality of being and doing. Being humble of heart calls us to let go of our plans, our ideas and yearn to know God's plans and designs. Let us passionately follow the Humble Servant, Christ.

These are the opening lyrics to a song written by Phillip Sandifer, that helped shape the attitude and prayer time of a small group of men, whom I call friends in Christ, that formed together to sing praise to our Creator over many years.

The group *Just Because* started out together on the invite of Dean Scouler asking me to join him in singing at Masses back in the early 90's. We were joined shortly after that by Don Schaack, and a few years later by Ken Didier and then by Doran Chandler. We formed together, not as a singing group, but rather as a brotherhood of men who came together to Praise God and allow Christ into our mist. "Where two or three gather in My Name, I am there present", a powerful promise that we experienced every time we got together to raise our squeaky voices in song.

The song goes on to say:

Folded in your arms, I've never been without you
Thru every tear I've ever cried, I've always found you there
Cradled in Your love, it's easy Lord to praise You
But even when the times get hard, and it seems that I'm alone
Still I'll always praise You Father, JUST BECAUSE YOU ARE!

Throughout the years that we gathered together to practice and sing at Masses, funerals, praise and worship gatherings, retirement homes, even a couple of weddings; we gathered as brothers in Christ traveling together in this world of joy, pain and suffering. We endured and upheld each other through the loss of family, the struggles of sons and daughters, facing our own personal demons, serious health issues, the gift of the next generation, and the joys of seeing each day as gift. We became family.

One of the last times we were able to gather together as the group *Just Because* was when we sang praise at Maryvale in February 2017. We gathered together on the Holy ground of Maryvale, in the Chapel, in front of the Blessed Sacrament in the Tabernacle, joined by the Sisters living at Maryvale and sang praise for over an hour. We were not there to entertain, but rather to enter into prayer and praise with the Sisters. It was perfect praise with imperfect voices.

The end of May 2017, Colleen and I both retired and have now moved to Minnesota. With this move came miles of separation from family and friends...miles only, not ties that have been cut. I no longer sing with my brothers as *Just Because*, but I remain in solidarity with them in giving Praise to a God who is getting less and less acknowledgement, respect and honor in our society each day. Oh, how our world today needs to acknowledge our one God more than ever!

THE last time that Just Because sang together, with me included, was when we led the music ministry for the Funeral celebration for Sr. Carol Jean Kuntz. Sr. Carol Jean had asked me months before her death if we would sing at her funeral. Hard to say no to a dear friend, but very hard to carry out. I teased Sr. CJ and told her we would sing the song "Give Me One More Shot", which triggered that special laugh that she had and of course she ended with "You're funny!" The actual songs sung at that funeral, selected by the Holy Spirit, brought a fitting end to the earthly journey of both Sr. Carol Jean and Just Because as I knew it.

### Sister Marguerite Guarneri, SMP

Sister Marguerite Louise Guarneri, 102, of Valley City, ND died at Maryvale Convent, Valley City, April 22, 2017. Her funeral Mass was celebrated April 27, 2017 in the Maryvale Chapel.

Sister Marguerite Guarneri was born April 6, 1915 in Spring Valley, IL to James and Mary (Marino) Guarneri. She attended grade school at Grant School, Spring Valley, IL, high school at Valley City, ND and Oakwood, ND. She received her bachelor's degree in French from the College of Great Falls, Montana in 1963.

Sister Marguerite entered the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation (SMP) in 1933 in Broons, France, and made her vows in 1935. During her Religious Life, she served at St. Martin's College, Rennes, France (1935-1937); St. Margaret's Hospital, Spring Valley, IL (1937-1954); St. Mary's School, Kenogami, Quebec, Canada (1954-1962); St. Cecilia's School, Harvey, ND (1963-1968); St. Catherine's School, Valley City, ND (1968-1977 and 1986-1989); St. Patrick's School, Washington, IL (1977-1983); and Maryvale Convent, Valley City, ND (1983-2017).

Sister Marguerite Guarneri was preceded in death by her parents; her brother Angelo and sisters Florence Straiski and Dorothy Piano, and her niece Patricia Donaldson. She is survived by her Religious Community, the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation; her nieces Rosemary Yerly, Sharon Johnson and Kathleen Lyons; and her nephews Frank, James and Thomas Piano.

She was a woman of many talents and interests. As many of you know, she loved to knit and crochet, and her finished products were perfect. She was in the midst of work when she died. She loved music, especially opera and country, writing poetry and reading a wide range of literary genre. Sister Marguerite loved to do research and archival work, often translating articles for Mary

Notes and Info Comm'. If she couldn't find the answer to a question she had about something that interested her, she would "dig" until she found it...even going to others to look it up on the internet! She enjoyed her daily walks outside (as long as she was able) and her quiet times of prayer.

Her ministries were varied. As a young woman, she desired to be a teacher. However, her early years in Religious Life, with ill health and obedience, led her to work as a secretary and do other duties at St. Margaret's Hospital. She began to flourish when she started teaching elementary grades and junior high. She continued to teach French to Mariana Rumer, Associate from Valley City, until shortly before her death.

She relished the opportunity to utilize the French language and became an excellent interpreter and translator. Many of the SMP historical books, written in French have been translated into English by Sister Marguerite.

She is greatly missed by everyone who knew her.

It was with gratitude and joy that the Sisters of our U.S. Province gathered at Maryvale for a Mass on April 30, 2017 to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of St. Catherine School and the Sisters' presence and ministry there during a major part of the century.

Very Rev. Andrew Jasinski, Director of Catholic Education and Chancellor of the Diocese of Fargo, was the main celebrant, with our chaplain, Fr. Donald Leiphon serving as concelebrant. The celebration opened with a joyful song and procession to the altar. Sister Suzanne Stahl, Provincial,

gave a welcome address. The Sisters, guests from the area and former students shared in the singing throughout the liturgy. Before the closing hymn, a list of twelve Sisters present who had taught at St. Catherine School throughout the years was read aloud by our Chaplain. Each Sister was asked to stand as her name and number of years she taught at St. Catherine's were read aloud. A list of thirty-seven deceased Sisters of Mary of the Presentation and the number of years each had taught at St. Catherine's was listed in the liturgy booklet.

It was a delightful evening for three Sisters of Mary of the Presentation, Sister Elizabeth Rose Muscha, Sister Dorothy Bunce and Sister Marlyss, as they joined St. Catherine School Alumni at the Eagle's Club on June 17, 2017. There were about one hundred ten guests at the event which began with a Social at 5:30 p.m. It was interesting to meet adults who had attended St. Catherine's School even in the early days of its existence.

Sister Carol Jean Kuntz, 65, of Valley City, ND died at Maryvale Convent, Valley City, May 3, 2017. Her funeral Mass was Monday, May 8, at 10:30 a.m. in the Maryvale Chapel, Valley City, ND. Visitation began with rosary at 4:00 p.m. Sunday, May 7, with a prayer service at 7:00 p.m. in the Maryvale Chapel. Father Donald Leiphon was the Mass celebrant.

Sister Carol Jean was born April 10, 1952 in Rugby, ND to Frank and Barbara Kuntz. She attended first grade at Long Lake #1, and from second grade through high school she attended Drake Public School, Drake, ND, graduating in 1970. After high school she worked at St. Andrew Hospital in Bottineau, ND in the Dietary Department. Sister Carol Jean's call to Religious Life occurred early one Sunday morning. She heard the church bells ringing and something stirred deep within her soul. After giving her life some serious thought, she got up and went to



Mass that Sunday. Her faith deepened as she listened to what God was asking of her, and she was attracted to the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation because of their dedication and prayerful presence to all who came to them. She entered the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation in 1978, professing her vows August 8, 1980 in the Maryvale Convent Chapel, Valley City, ND. Sister Carol Jean earned her bachelor of arts degree in Elementary Education from Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois in 1983. She later earned a master's degree in Religious Studies from Gonzaga, University, Spokane, Washington in 1994.

Sister Carol Jean began her teaching career in Princeton, Illinois, teaching third grade from 1983 - 1988, and again from 1993 - 1996. She taught fourth grade in Washington, Illinois from 1988 - 1993. Her students fondly remember her as a creative teacher who played the guitar and sang with them. In 1996, Sister Carol Jean was selected to serve on the Provincial Administration Team of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation as Provincial Assistant and Treasurer. She held this position until 2005, when she was selected to serve as



Provincial of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation. She held this position until 2014, when she was selected to once again serve as the Provincial Assistant and Treasurer.

Sister Carol Jean was preceded in death by her father Frank, her infant brother Neil, brother-in-law Peter Bachmeier, sister-in-law Nita Kuntz, and nephew Myles Kuntz. She is survived by her Religious Community, the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation; her mother Barbara, seven brothers, Mike (Cindy), Frank, Larry, Bill, Ken, Darryl (Mary Jeanne), and Wayne (Hilda), and four sisters, Betty Bachmeier, Barbara (Kip) Berentson, Mona (Mario Cano) Kuntz, and Candy (Troy) Munyer, 23 nieces and nephews, and 35 great nieces and nephews. Sister Carol Jean is greatly missed by all who knew her.





### Prayer at St. Aloisius Medical Center



On the first Tuesday of every month a short prayer time is held for the staff, who want to and can take 5 minutes, to gather either in the lobby of St. Aloisius Hospital or some place in St. Aloisius Nursing Home. The people gather to pray for some family member or friend that might be having surgery or is very sick. Morning and evening prayer is said over the loud speaker each day as well. There is a picture of a prayer tree near the front door of the hospital. Anyone can write a name of a person who is sick, in the hospital, or just in need of prayer on a slip of paper that they attach to the tree.

Near the end of August, Sr. Mary Agnes started to hold prayer time twice a month with the residents. On Unit A it take place on Monday at 2:30 PM, and then on Unit B at 2:45 PM. This was something new for the residents, and staff is free to join in as well. After these sessions, the prayer request is written on a small piece of paper and then posted on a board that an activities staff member made with chicken wire. Family members of the residents may write their request down as well.

The staff also offers a special prayer called "Precious Good-bye" for a loved one who is dying. Family members and friends are invited to be a part of the prayer service. This is done when a resident or patient is near death. Staff members that have taken care of them are free to join in as well. One of the prayer shawls made by Sr. Eloise Marie is given to anyone who is in the dying process.



Families are pleased when this prayer has been done, and staff members are happy that St. Aloisius Medical Center can offer the time for prayer whenever it is wanted or needed.

### Aging with Intention...Bits and Pieces

Dayna Larson-Hurst, consultant on the elderly to Religious Congregations, gave input to and facilitated a discussion on Retirement for the Sisters on August 26, 2017 at Maryvale. She answered the questions: What does aging mean? How do you age with intention? How do we change physically, spiritually, mentally, emotionally, and socially as we age? Sister Therese Celine took copious notes and shares some of them with us in this article.

Aging is both a slowing down and time for more prayer. We often use different expressions at different ages, such as *under* the age of ten, *in* the teens, we've *become* twenty-one, we are *turning* 30 and *pushing* 40, we have *made it* to 50, 60...*Medicare*, we have *reached* 70, we *get into* our 80's, in our 90's...we are *almost* 100!

Society does not celebrate all stages of life, aging is looked upon as the time when we are left with diminished power and we may be discriminated against. There is often a stigma attached to aging, and it becomes a justice issue when people are treated as "less than."

We need to recognize the reality of aging and plan for today and for the future. It would be helpful if we develop and embrace a philosophy of aging. It is never too early to prepare for aging.

The aging process should be holistic and healthy. Components of caring for ourselves as we age include physical, aesthetical, cognitive, spiritual, emotional, and social. Examples of each of these would be: exercise; music and art; activities, such as puzzles, word searches, games, and reading, that keep the brain active; prayer and quiet time; having a good support system in place; and the use of eye glasses and hearing aids.

We need to understand that changes often occur within us and we must make wise choices to adapt to our new reality. Don't set ourselves up for failure, be positive, eliminate the negative, and "don't mess with Mr. In-Between." Learn to "Travel Light", that is, each month try to give up something to lighten the load of what we possess. Some questions to ask ourselves may be:

What do we need to think about?

How can we be more positive?

What are our reasonable expectations?

Are we willing to ask for help when we need it?

How do we prevent injuries?

How do we accommodate changes?



Dayna asked us, "When it comes to aging what will be the hardest thing to say good-bye to?" Some answers were: lifting, writing letters, pushing heavy things, and doing things for myself. When she asked us the question, "What would you like to say 'hello' to?" some of the answers were: Heaven, Jesus, God, family, Being and not Doing, inner wisdom and to trust it, to be at peace with who I am, time for silence, time to be alone, time to visit with the Sisters to get to know them better.

Some things the Sisters want to do as they grow older gracefully are pray more and enjoy the quiet, be more of a "be-er" and not so much a "do-er". Some would like to write poems, go outside more to admire God's creation and beauty, or do little jobs around the house as they are able. Some would like to listen to classical music or offer to say or lead rosary for whoever wants to join in.

Holistic aging as a Community needs good leadership, sound finances, support systems in place, and more physical space for freer movement. As we write our philosophy of aging we must take into account our values, priorities, the how-when-where to live out our lives as fully as we can.

When asked about our hopes for the support we will receive as we age, we listed: talk gently, to be treated with dignity and respect for we are all children of God, an atmosphere of calm, people who take time to listen to me, to be able to participate in spiritual and social things in Community, to be able to spend time outdoors, to sing...and many more.

Our hopes for our Sisters as they age are to have a compassionate staff, patience with each other, continue to grow interiorly in the spiritual life, and visits from people who can be a listening presence. We would like to consider Maryvale our home until we die. The space at St. Anne's Wing will be assessed and the needs will be addressed over the coming months.

### Sister Margaret Rose Pfeifer, SMP

Sister Margaret Rose Pfeifer died in Harvey, ND August 22, 2017. Her Funeral Mass was August 25, 2017 in the Maryvale Chapel with Father Donald Leiphon officiating.

Sister Margaret Rose (Willis Marie) Pfeifer was born September 2, 1926 to William M. and Ida J. (Zimprich) Pfeifer, Cooperstown, ND. She was a member of St. Lawrence's Catholic Church, Jessie, ND being baptized September 19, 1926. She deepened her baptismal vows by making vows of consecrated chastity, obedience and poverty to God with the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation, August 29, 1945. She lived a long life of fruitful service as a teacher, leader, lobbyist, and health care ethicist and advocate.



In Sister Margaret Rose's words:

"A vocation is a call which I believe is never finished until we meet God face to face. My story begins on a farm in a mission area of North Dakota. As a farmer, there is closeness and an awareness of God as in no other occupation. Our family did not have what is often called the piety of a good Catholic family, but we were very faithful to the tradition with my parents even sending me to a Catholic School. The local Church was carried out in a family home. This is where we had Sunday Mass, Saturday Catechism, and sometimes the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We went to confession face to face long before it became ordinary in the Church. It was at the kitchen table in a private home. As a young girl I said I wanted to be a Sister hardly knowing what that was. In the later years of grade school we had the Sisters of Saint Joseph for summer catechism. These were the only Religious Sisters I knew yet they didn't appeal to me. When I was a sophomore in high school we moved farther from town and I was able to attend St. Catherine's Catholic

School in Valley City. Here I met our Sisters and through discussions with Sister Mary Severin, I decided to enter the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation. At that time I saw my vocation in two ways, teaching, that is reaching out to the poor in one way or another and secondly, I would be sure to be doing the will of God at all times.

God's grace sustained me in the Novitiate where we had French morning, noon and might and a few times in between. Our prayers were in French. Meditation was in French. Only a trust in God kept me there. The first years of a professed life were of the same nature along with an obedience (being told where to live and what ministry to do) which again required a trust in God. Then came English meditation books, each her own, followed by individual directed retreats. Now my vocation developed in an entirely different manner. No long was it important what I did, but the development of a close relationship with God became my goal. Now being the Presence of Jesus to those around me is a result of living close to God and being in God's presence. Because of the long years of experience, I find people see this without a special effort on my part. Soon more effort will be spent in preparing for the final call of God. So, my vocation was not a beginning or an end, but a continuous answer of "yes" to God."

She did speak of her preparation for death and her drawing closer to God these past few years and I feel she was prepared. Tuesday morning she knew she was having a heart attack, received the Anointing of the Sick, the Apostolic blessing and made her preferences for health care clearly known.

Sister Margaret Rose taught 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade in Wild Rice, ND 1945-47; she did various miscellaneous duties in our

SMP Health System hospitals from 1947-48; She taught grades 3, 4, 5 in Lisbon, ND 1948-1949; She taught grades 2 and 3 at St. Cecilia's Catholic School in Harvey from 1950-51 and taught grades 7 and 8 and was the principal from 1951-1960; 1957 she received a Bachelor's degree from Great Falls University, Montana with a Major in Mathematics and Education and Minors in Chemistry, Biology and English. She taught high school at Notre Dame Academy, Willow City, ND from 1960-1968. 1968 she received her Master's degree from Creighton University, Omaha, NE with a major in biology and chemistry and minor in secondary education. 1968-69 she taught high school science and 1969-73 continued teaching all levels and grades and types of sciences at St. Catherine's School, Valley City, ND; She then served as the social service director at Presentation Medical Center, Rolla for a time while also teaching at Belcourt and Rolla high schools. She began teaching at Turtle Mountain College, Belcourt in 1979. She was on the leadership council of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation beginning in 1968. From 1976 – 1984 she was Provincial Councilor while continuing to teach at Turtle Mountain Community College; 1990-1992 she was the Master Teacher for Instructors for Early Childhood and Parents in the Comprehensive Child Development Program at Little Hoop Community College, Fort Totten, ND. She was the Provincial of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation 1992-1996. She attended a Theological Sabbatical September – December 1996. Since January 1997 she has served with SMP Health System and been a lobbyist at the North Dakota legislative sessions.

She is survived by her Religious Sisters of Mary of the Presentation, her sister Arlene (Frank) Heinz, Cooperstown, ND; nieces Brenda (Jan) Von Bank, West Fargo, ND and Barbara (Phil) Kameo, Sauk Rapids, MN; and nephews Michael (LuAnn) Heinz, Ellendale, ND, Jeffrey Heinz, Cooperstown, ND and numerous great nephews and nieces. She was preceded in death by her parents.

The SMP Health System honored Sister Margaret Rose with a plaque depicting her favorite prayer, the prayer of St. Ignatius of Loyola. In the corner is a paperweight from a Catholic Health Association Assembly which signifies her advocacy for healthcare for the poor and vulnerable.



### Faith in Action in Harvey, ND

Faith in Action is a volunteer program that provides transportation to out of town medical appointments for residents of Harvey and the surrounding area. They usually travel to Bismarck or Minot. Currently there are 8 volunteer drivers, and they receive a mileage reimbursement at the current IRS rate. Faith in Action is funded by private donations, business donations, and fundraisers like a bake sale. Riders are not charged for this service.

St. Aloisius Medical Center and the Community of Harvey sponsored a bake sale on September 21, 2017 in honor of St. Vincent De Paul Feast Day. People from the community and the hospital



brought in delicious baked goods and the residents of St. Aloisius Nursing Home did their part by preparing several items for sale. The St. Vincent DePaul Day bake sale at St. Aloisius netted \$1,240.76 to help Faith in Action.
