How do a former Barnes County, ND farm boy and Saskatchewan, Canada farm girl wind up growing crops in Africa to help families who lack food security? If you had asked my wife, Christine, and I a few years ago when we started planning for retirement, we would not have had a clue! But here we are, knee-deep in rich, brown, tropical soil, and the adventure is just beginning!

Christine, and I started planning for retirement about ten years ago. When we got married in 2010, it was a pre-requisite on her part that we would spend winters in a warmer climate. In 2012 with the help of a former colleague of Christine's, we searched for and found a modest place in Arizona that we loved. We took the plunge and looked forward to brown Christmases and wearing shorts and T-shirts in January! In the years following, we frequently traveled to Arizona for vacations, longing for the day when we could go down and stay the entire winter.

Beyond this, our retirement plans included going on travel adventures like Viking River Cruises and Rick Steves European tours. And of course, we reasoned, we'd have more time for grandchildren and our favorite hobbies. We've now learned that God has other plans for us.

In 2021, I completed 39 years as a health care administrator in North Dakota. The last fourteen of those were spent as CEO of SMP Health—Ave Maria (formerly Ave Maria Village) in Jamestown, a long term care ministry of the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation (SMP). Early on, I developed a deep affinity for the Sisters and everything they stood for. This led me to become an Associate of the SMP's in 2009. Wanting to be part of their ministry, we also began sponsoring a high school student in the Sisters' Cameroon mission.

Christine had lived in North Dakota since coming to Dickinson to attend college in the 1970s. She worked in education for nearly forty years, teaching high school art for most of that time. After our marriage, she moved to Jamestown and ended her career with eight years at Kensal Public School, thirty miles north of Jamestown, teaching art and music to mainly elementary students on a part-time basis. The last two years we were both working were 2020 and 2021, which were of course at the height

of the COVID pandemic. This greatly increased the stress in both the health care and education fields. Although we had both enjoyed our careers, we were truly ready to be done! Plans were made to retire in Jamestown, and as stated before, spend winters in Phoenix.

In my job at Ave Maria, our workforce had, over time, become increasingly diverse. Near the end of my tenure, several immigrants from Liberia, West Africa were on our payroll, mainly working as certified nursing assistants. Some had lived in the U.S. for many years, while others had only recently arrived. I was impressed by the spirit, compassion, and hard work they displayed in taking care of our residents, beside their strong Christian faith. Upon getting to know them better, I discovered that many still had family members in Liberia. Several were helping support these loved ones by sending them part of their wages. The stories they told of life in Liberia were compelling, and the needs of the people living over there seemed overwhelming to Christine and me, especially in comparison to the blessings we enjoy in America.

Two brutal civil wars in the last generation wreaked havoc on the Liberian economy, and on the people themselves, with many citizens being killed or resettled in refugee camps in neighboring countries. In the past ten years, the situation has stabilized considerably, and efforts are being made to strengthen Liberian democracy, although corruption continues to be a problem in the country.

Many Liberians spend most of their energy and time just trying to put a roof over their heads and an adequate supply of food on the table. It is popularly believed by experts that the key to rising out of poverty and moving toward self-reliance and sustainability is education. However, without food security, education becomes difficult, if not impossible. How can one be educated and work their way out of poverty when they suffer from malnutrition and even possibly starvation?

It was through these native Liberians at Ave Maria that we got acquainted with 29-year-old Bill Woyah, a teacher and part-time Christian minister near Monrovia, the capital city of Liberia. Bill's objective at the time we met him was to come to America to study information technology at the university level, and then return to Liberia and use

his newfound knowledge to help improve life for his people. Christine and I agreed to help sponsor Bill, and plans were made for him to come to the States. However, upon applying for a student visa at the U. S. embassy in Monrovia in 2021, Bill was summarily turned down, with no specific reason given. We learned later that the underlying reason for not allowing foreign nationals into the country had much to do with America wanting to curtail the number of immigrants entering our borders, particularly from developing nations. At first Bill was discouraged, but as we talked about it, we realized that this was very likely God closing a door. But the wonderful thing about our God is that when he closes one door, he almost always opens another one!

It was this setback that gave us the impetus to form a nonprofit organization, which is named Living is Giving, Inc. (LIG). Through LIG, we and our partners in Liberia and the U.S. are determined to make a difference in the lives of as many people as we can reach. The organization is registered as a charity in North Dakota and has received 501(c)3 tax-exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service. LIG has established a small farm which we hope will place food on the table of numerous Liberian families. Women from the local area volunteer their time to cultivate crops on

a plot of land which has been purchased through our own personal funds and help from other individuals and families who believe in the project. The hope is to eventually diversify the project by adding livestock and/or poultry, and with God's help, make the venture partially sustainable.

Living is Giving has also taken on an existing children's ministry in the same area called Bible Talk Organization (BTO). BTO operates in three different communities and strives to feed the souls and the bodies of Liberian youth of all ages. This is accomplished by sharing the good news of Jesus through non-denomination Bible teaching, singing, worship, and providing food for the children who attend when possible. Our partner, Bill, whom we refer to as our "boots on the ground in Liberia",

was the founder of BTO. Many of the volunteers who are involved in the farming operation are also part

of the BTO ministry



Future plans include the establishment of a school to provide Liberian children a well-rounded education which includes such things as agricultural best practices,

nutrition, and health/hygiene. The Liberian public school system is technically free to all, but is plagued by a severe shortage of teachers, lack of school facilities and supplies, and severe underfunding. Many villages in the rural areas of the country do not even have schools. Parents are also expected to purchase their children's school uniforms, books, and supplies, which are beyond the reach of many families. We are also considering offering small "micro-loans", at a low rate of interest, which could help Liberians start or grow cottage businesses to help their owners rise above poverty and become self-sufficient.

What else does God have in mind for Living is Giving? We don't exactly know, but we do have a strong sense of his leading in all of this. Alone we cannot improve the lot of all 5 million Liberian citizens. But like the story of the little boy who was walking along the beach where millions of starfish had washed up on shore and was throwing them back in the water one at a time, we can make a difference to some, if not many, people in need of our help.



These pictures show young Cassava plants. Tapioca is made from Cassava flour. The greens are cooked and used to make sauce for rice and the root tubers make various flour type things or are just cooked and eaten. It will be ready to harvest in 6 months.

During their recent trip to Liberia, Christine asked some of the women why they volunteered to be a part of LIG when it is very hard work for no pay. I was told they believe in the vision, one lady says she works for her grandchildren's future. Another said it isn't for immediate gain but for long term gain for food and education. Another said "it has given us hope for the future."



500-MILE PILGRIMAGE

Maryvale...a "New" Beginning

On October 3, 2022, the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation celebrated a "new" beginning for Maryvale Convent. The Sisters have called Maryvale home since 1965. It has been for them a place to gather for meetings, a place where the administration of the Community is carried out, a place for retreats and a place to share religious life with one another. None of that will change. What *does* change is who owns the building and the property and who is in charge of the retreats and hospitality.

The creation of a new non-profit, Maryvale Corporation, is the result of years of planning and prayer by the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation. The Sisters realized that with the lack of vocations and their numbers declining, they would eventually be unable to continue the ministries of retreats and hospitality. They desired to continue these ministries for the people of the Fargo Diocese. After brainstorming ideas and checking out some possibilities, they approached Bishop John T. Folda, Bishop of the Fargo Diocese. After sever-

al discussions with the Bishop and his staff, the Sisters decided to sell Maryvale (property, buildings and ministry) to the Diocese of Fargo. The Sisters will continue to live at Maryvale as long as needed, while the retreat center is now owned and managed by Maryvale.

The celebration of Maryvale's "new" beginning began with a prayer service led by Bishop Folda, which included prayers for the strengthening and blessing of all who will begin or continue their work of hospitality and evangelization at Maryvale. Prayers were also asked that the ministry of Maryvale may grow in faith, hope and love, and that all who come to Maryvale may experience the Holy Spirit's deep abiding presence.

As Sister Suzanne handed the "key" to Bishop Folda, she said, "While this is not the key to the kingdom of God nor the key to the kingdom of heaven, it is the key to Maryvale. May Maryvale's mission of evangelization continue until all people know and follow Jesus Christ."...to which all replied, "Amen. Alleluia!"

After blessing the water to be used, Bishop Folda processed with all those present to various parts of Maryvale, as he sprinkled and blessed the areas to be used in the ministries of Maryvale. As they walked, all sang: "This is holy ground, we're standing on holy ground. For the Lord is present, and where God is, is holy. This is holy ground, we're standing on holy ground.
